Beyond these major events, troopers actively participated in other community-focused events across the state, including the Holmes Elementary STEM Camp, Gretna Days, National Night Out, multiple county fairs, and more! These events provided excellent opportunities for troopers to interact with the public, offering demonstrations

from different divisions, crash simulations, and career advice for prospective troopers.

As summer drew people to travel across the state, the Nebraska State Patrol continued to focus on pub-

Special Operations

Aviation Support Unit (ASU)

The Aviation Support Unit continues to remain busy. From conducting much needed surveillance, pursuits, tactical flight officer trainings, gameday traffic flights, and connecting with the community, the ASU plays a critical role in ensuring the safety of Nebraskans.

This quarter multiple Special Operations units came together to assist the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) in locating a wanted Fugitive Murder for Hire Suspect. The suspect was found to be traveling in a semi-truck trailer (permitted load) in North Dakota and thought to be traveling south towards Nebraska. The Nebraska Permit showed the exact routes that the suspect would be traveling through.

The Aviation Support Unit conducted surveillance and found the semi traveling south through the state. This surveillance allowed the vehicle to be contacted at a controlled location and the suspect was arrested without issue by the FBI Special Weapons and Tactics team. This proved to be good teamwork with our allied agencies along with other State Patrol units and divisions such as the Police Service Dogs Unit, Investigative Services, Patrol, and Carrier

Enforcement Divisions.

The ASU has also assisted in numerous pursuits throughout the quarter. This has allowed the patrol to continue to have a visual on suspects who flee from law enforcement, ensuring a swift apprehension.

In addition to these flight missions, the ASU was able to host the Cub Scouts Pack 20. Engaging with youth is a rewarding opportunity for our Troopers. It

creates a lasting connection and hopefully inspires the next generation to join the patrol!





Emergency Preparedness Coordination

The Nebraska State Patrol's Emergency Preparedness Coordination comes in many forms. This quarter the patrol received an Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC) request for Troopers to assist in providing security for the Republican National Convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

So, what exactly does this request mean? The EMAC is a nationwide system dedicated to sharing resources across all 50 states. When a state is in need of extra assistance during major events or emergencies, they are able to submit a request for additional personnel resources. Due to the size of the event, Wisconsin requested additional personnel to ensure the safety of all those in attendance.

The Nebraska State Patrol responded to the request and de-

ployed 12 Troopers to Milwaukee for the event, from July 13th to 19th. The Troopers received great reports from the Milwaukee Police Department's command staff and the Secret Service on their hard work and professionalism. The Secret Service did seek out our Troopers due to work ethic/ professionalism during this assignment.

The Nebraska State Patrol remains committed to providing emergency assistance to fellow states when needed.



Hazardous Device Technician (HDT)

This quarter the Hazardous Device Technicians (HDT) unit kept busy with multiple calls.

Last month, in Jefferson County, a potentially hazardous device was found by a local trash compony in one of their dumpsters. Thankfully, the device was determined to be a hoax. However it was good for our allied agency and the trash company to take the potential threat seriously by contacting the Nebraska State Patrol's HDT team for assistance.

Special Operations

Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT)

Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Basic took place this quarter at Hasting Greenlief NNG training site, September 23rd to October 4th, with a total of 11 Troopers completing the two-week program.

This training allowed those who have an interest in becoming a SWAT team member to attend. While in attendance, the trainees were able to not only work on their individual skills, but practice working with a small team.

Team skills were tested during the final week of training in a 20-hour training evaluation with a 7-mile team challenge at night. The challenge required the trainees to preform various tasks that simulate a real life emergent scenario. Trainees needed to accomplish building clearing, raid planning, manhunt formations, team lifts, a military obstacle course, a rope climb, and much more while dressed in full SWAT gear. The evaluations are not made to be simple or easy. They are designed after possible scenarios that the SWAT

team may need to be prepared for.

Many SWAT team members put in long days of teachings and prepping, so those attending could be challenged. Thank you to Troop Area Leadership in supporting the Troopers who attended and/or taught at this year's SWAT basic training!



Police Service Dogs (PSD)

This quarter was filled with hard work and accolades for the Nebraska State Patrol's Police Service Dogs. Last month was National Dog Day and to celebrate the PSD team put together a video that highlighted the training the dogs undergo as well as some fun moments throughout the year.

Trooper Donner and K9 Tilt were honored by the National Tactical Officers Association at the NTOA convention in Kansas City last month for their work with the NSP SWAT Team. They were specifically honored for a deployment during a barricaded subject call which posed significant officer safety risks. Way to go, Trooper Donner and K9 Tilt, for your continued hard work. While Trooper Donner and K9 Tilt have been earning welldeserved recognition, their fellow troopers and K9 partners have also been hard at work.

Trooper Potthoff and his K9, Amos, recently assisted in a significant narcotics bust. While responding to a traffic stop

initiated by **Trooper Sutton** near mile marker 328 on I-80 Eastbound, K9 Amos alerted to the presence of narcotics. A subsequent search of the vehicle uncovered 13 pounds of marijuana.

From awards to critical operations, the Nebraska State Patrol's Police Service Dogs continue to demonstrate their

vital role in keeping communities safe.

Featured Divisions: Criminal Identification Division and Vehicle Installation Building

Criminal Identification Division (CID)

The Criminal Identification Division (CID) is comprised of 65 employees across II teams.

As we enter the last quarter of 2024 and the upcoming 2025 Legislative session, the Criminal Identification Division (CID) will be working with NSP Professional Standards to both submit legislative proposals that enhance public safety, as well as monitor new legislation that will impact the division. Each year the number of categories CID is required to perform background checks for increases due to Legislative mandates. We expect this to be true for 2025. As a result, we are proactively planning for the additional workload.

CID recently completed an audit conducted by the Legislative Performance Audit Committee. This audit was to evaluate the process at DHHS and NSP for background checks of daycare providers and staff. The final audit report was re-

leased in September and is available to the public. We appreciated the opportunity to be involved in the audit and assist in improving services directed towards the daycare providers throughout the state.

Grant funding for projects both inside and outside of CID have increased each year. CID currently manages a total of 3 grants, with the most recent award amounts exceeding \$4.7 million dollars. These grant funds drive many projects and staffing for several CID teams, including: Centralized Protection Order Office (CPO), Concealed Handgun Permits (CHP), Sex Offender Registry (SOR), Administrative Office of the Courts/JUSTICE Program (AOC), National Instant Criminal Background System (NICS), National Criminal History Improvement Program (NICS), Quality Assurance Information Program (QAIP) and Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS).

One of the many projects that CID is working on is a \$11.35M major upgrade of the state AFIS system, which is nearing end-of -life. With grant funding assistance through the NCHIP grant, this project will provide best-n-class accuracy, lights out matching for both tenprint and latent, multi-incident matching, move to a secure government cloud environment with Evergreen support, AFIS workstation upgrades every five years, and more. This project is expected to begin in early 2025.



Vehicle Installation Building (VIB)

The staff at the NSP Supply and Engineering have seen several recent changes. After 43 years of dedicated service, Steve Krueger walked out the door of the VIB as an employee for the Nebraska State Patrol for the final time on August 2nd 2024. Steve's retirement was a big one for NSP as he will be missed. When Steve started building cars for NSP the technicians had a shop in the basement of NSP State Headquarters. Steve was instrumental to the agency during many changes over the years. Steve retired as an Electronic Technician Leader at the VIB. This was a position Steve had held since July 2003. Prior to that, Steve was the Facility Maintenance Specialist. He started his career in 1981 as an Auto Mechanic II. Steve's Electronic Technician Leader position was recently filled by Kari Hernandez. Kari was promoted to this position from an Electronics Technician Senior position. Congratulations Kari!

The VIB is currently (2) positions short, and an additional FTE was removed from our previous authorized strength. We have put a lot of work into sourcing and social media with the hope of having a successful hiring process to fill these positions. NSP will be taking applications for the position of Electronic Technician Senior starting October 1st. Our team is ready to welcome a few new teammates to come on board.

Currently, the agency has 13 Troopers out of camp working in the field in the FTO program. We were able to get units issued to all 13 Troopers. Some were issued units as early as 2 months prior to working the road on their own. This

allowed the Troops on FTO to work out of their own units while in training. To make this happen, it took a lot of great communication with the command staff in each troop area. It is pretty rewarding for the VIB team to see new Troopers come in and get issued their first patrol car.

A recent renovation project is nearing completion at the VIB facility. Pallet racking has been installed in two locations within the building. The idea is to get everything off the ground to create more space to park completed units and to create more space to work. With this we were able to organize supplies to increase efficiency for the technicians when building units. A new vehicle lift is on the horizon.

The VIB team traveled the state and reprogrammed nearly 420 radios. This project took approximately one month. The Troopers have several new radars in the field. The team has replaced 80 radars that were not longer serviceable. Jeff Kubitz and Pat Olsen have been busy as always. Jeff was previously tasked with managing unit damage claims which is very time consuming. Pat is on top of the supply inventory so the Troopers can stop in an get what they need without delay.




